

The Climate Change Adaptation Challenge

As greenhouse gas emissions continue to rise and populations around the world begin to feel the impacts of climate change, the international community has come to understand the crucial necessity of adaptation.


Climate change will disproportionately harm the world's poorest and most vulnerable people, those who contributed least to the problem.





The Climate Change Adaptation Challenge

Increasing focus is now being placed on how to assist communities with climate change adaptation through efforts to preserve their livelihoods, improve their resilience, and reduce poverty even in the face of major challenges.





The Bangladesh Context

Bangladesh is considered one of the world's most vulnerable countries to climate change.

Predicted impacts such as sea-level rise and increased extreme weather events will pose serious challenges in a context of significant poverty and high population densities.





The Bangladesh Context

Yet Bangladesh has also taken on a role as a global leader and pioneer among developing nations in responding to climate change.

Lessons learned and success stories from the Bangladesh experience can help guide adaptation in other countries.





What is Community-Based Adaptation?

Community-Based Adaptation (CBA) aims to engage local communities in an empowering process of evaluating their climate vulnerabilities and drawing from both traditional knowledge and advanced scientific research to devise sustainable solutions to climate change adaptation.¹





What is Community-Based Adaptation?

Despite growing agreement about the importance of CBA as a crucial approach to adaptation, few strong case studies and evidence-based analyses exist to guide CBA programs.² More work is needed to build best practices and models for effective CBA.





- ARCAB (Action Research for Community Adaptation in Bangladesh) aims to pursue a long-term research agenda with a focus on learning by doing.
- ARCAB research will assess and draw lessons and new knowledge from the work of NGOs in Bangladesh that are actively implementing community-based adaptation projects in twenty sites across the country.

- ARCAB will work with partners to design research that evaluates the effectiveness of CBA activities






















Research Partners

- Researchers will work with Action Partners to design short, medium, and long-term research plans across many themes related to CBA




















